

Journey Home Community Assists in Reclaiming Identity *by Mike Starr*

“In a new country, with no job and no family, you feel that you have no identity. That is why Journey Home Community was so important to us. They gave us friendship. They helped us to do the simple things like start a bank account, find a house, a school for the kids, furniture ...”

When Ahmad and Tabana (not their real names) came to Canada with their children a few years ago, it was not the first time they had left Afghanistan because of concern for their safety. As a young boy, Ahmad’s family had fled to Iran to escape the fighting with Soviet forces. After having been jailed during the Taliban era, Ahmad and his wife and daughter fled to Pakistan as the American bombing began. Each time, the family returned to Afghanistan when it was safer. But now, even though the Taliban is no longer in power, extremist groups punish people who question their ideas. Again, it was becoming unsafe for Ahmad and his family. Now with a family of five, they arrived in Canada to start a new life.

Journey Home Community came alongside the family in the early days after they arrived in Canada. Volunteers and staff helped Ahmad and Tabana through the many small tasks that we take for granted when we move. They also gave friendship, something that is not so easy to find when you don’t

speaking the language of your neighbours. That friendship was very important to Tabana when, a short time after arriving in Canada, her father died in Afghanistan. Of course, it was not safe for her to return for the funeral.

Ahmad and Tabana’s children are very bright, and adapting quickly to their new country. The oldest – we’ll call her Hina – says that Canadian schools are more fun, because they are not too strict. She plays volleyball and basketball, and her favourite subject is Math! She wants to be a therapist when she grows up. Hina’s younger brother, Khan, also likes Math. He plays soccer and likes to write fiction books. He writes and illustrates stories of dragons. He taught his younger sister, Perkha, how to read and write, though she is only in Kindergarten. Perkha now writes and illustrates her own stories.

The story of this family has some difficult chapters, but is looking brighter all the time, thanks in part to Journey Home Community.

Walk in the shoes of a family facing persecution. If your family's life is in **DANGER**, you run. There's no time to stand in a queue, even if one existed. In 1969, Canada signed the Geneva Convention Relating to the Status on Refugees to ensure that **PROTECTION** is guaranteed in our laws. This guarantees that **NEVER AGAIN** will those fleeing persecution ever fear being sent away without having their claim evaluated on its merits, as happened to the Jewish refugees aboard the MS St. Louis, who were refused entry to Canada in 1939.

Journey Home Community is participating with the Canadian Council For Refugees (CCR) in a national social campaign - **Proud to Protect Refugees** - to combat negative publicity and build a positive message in the public marketplace. We believe that pro-
